About the Legislative Update

The Legislative Update is made possible by the Utah Audubon Council and contributing organizations. Each Update provides bill and budget item descriptions and status updates throughout the Session, as well as important Session dates and key committees. For the most up-to-date information and the names and contact information for all legislators, check the Legislature's website at www.le.utah.gov. The Legislative Update focuses on legislative information pertaining to wildlife, sensitive and invasive species, public lands, state parks, SITLA land management, energy development, renewable energy and conservation, and water issues. The Update will be distributed after each Friday of the Session. We may also send out additional Action Alerts during the Session as issues arise that need quick action. We hope each Update issue will prepare you to contact your legislators with your opinions and concerns!

ACTION ALERT!

Rep. Carl Albrecht is asking for \$2,000,000 for the state to sue the U.S. EPA over a proposed rule change that would require the state's coal-fired power plants to install selective catalytic reduction equipment to reduce haze and air pollution. Rocky Mountain Power says it will "lawyer up" with its significant resources, but wants the state to lead out on the suit. Contact Appropriations Committee members (two Committees listed below) to suggest that money would be better spent helping coal industry workers transition to a clean energy future!

News of Week One (Week # 2)

Turf removal and wise landscaping bills conservation bills were introduced and a couple advanced in committee action, including SB 76, which will help to coordinate local land use planning with water supply plans.

Two bills that we strongly support were introduced last week. HB 286 would direct your sales tax dollars to saving Great Salt Lake rather than developing the destructive, expensive and unnecessary Lake Powell Pipeline and Bear River Development Projects. SCR 6 encourages efforts and policies that target raising GSL to 4,200' in elevation.

Two bills we strongly oppose, SB 113 to block local control over CAFOs and SB 107 to fund a hydrocarbon highway in the Uinta Basin passed their respective committees.

We convinced SB 53 bill sponsor Sen. Vickers to restore language that protects against interbasin transfers of water for aquifer recharge. SB 119 also passed committee and we will continue to work to amend it and assure transparency and participation in its implementation.

Budget News

The Legislature passed all the base budget bills, so the Appropriations Subcommittees move now to consideration of one-time and on-going new revenues (the "surplus"). This review process will continue for the next two weeks, and when the revenue projects are available in mid-February the prioritization - and serious budget jockeying - will begin. We also expect to see several new funding requests for water-related efforts during "Water Week".
