# **About the Legislative Update**

The Legislative Update is made possible by the Utah Audubon Council and contributing organizations. Each Update provides bill and budget item descriptions and status updates throughout the Session, as well as important Session dates and key committees. The Legislative Update focuses on legislative information pertaining to wildlife, sensitive and invasive species, public lands, state parks, SITLA land management, energy development, renewable energy and conservation, and water issues. The Update will be distributed after each Friday of the Session. We may also send out additional Action Alerts during the Session as issues arise that need quick action. We hope each Update

issue will prepare you to contact your legislators with your opinions and concerns!

### **ACTION ALERT!**

Now is the time in the Session to contact members of the Executive Appropriations Committee to support or oppose funding requests (see Budget News below).

Consider supporting the Governor's requests for \$519 m. for water projects and programs and \$25.5 m. for a year of fare free transit on UTA. Also worthy of our lobbying support is \$5 m. for turf removal rebates, \$2 m. for critical lands conservation, \$232,000 for dust impact monitoring, and \$250,000 for Utah Avalanche Center. Oppose the \$500,000 "Hunter Nation" funding request to delist wolves and \$2m. to sue EPA over its ozone transport rule.

# News of Week Four (Week # 4)

One good bill we've worked on, SB 53, has already passed both chambers and will be signed by the Governor. A couple of bills we'd like to see get hearings and votes, HB 220 and HB 286, remain stuck in Rules. Two bills we have opposed, SB 107 and SB 113, have passed the Senate, 107 on a party-line vote.

One bill we haven't yet seen but anticipate will emerge before the Session ends that we would to fight would allow the Grandeur Peak/Parley's Canyon gravel pit to be built. We are also keeping our eyes out for legislation pertaining to the Promontory Point landfill, just in case. There are bill files open for "Utah Inland Port Authority Amendments" and for "Great Salt Lake Authority" that we can expect to drop any day now. While the UIPA bill may be an improvement over the current statute, we expect that the GSL bill will be a poison pill we will have to fight. Stay tuned....

# **Budget News**

Appropriations Subcommittees finished their new money priorities and recommendations by Wednesday, and presented them to Executive Appropriations Committee,

which will begin the budget-building process over the next two weeks.

Several funding requests that we support were prioritized high enough that they will likely make it into the final budget bills. These include \$200 m. for ag water optimization, \$12.7 m. for drinking water, \$15 m. for the Great Salt Lake Trust, \$6m. for wetlands acquisition, \$750,500 for groundwater monitoring & investigations, \$1.1 m. for mapping GSL and Bear Lake bottoms, \$500,000 for waterland planning integration, and \$872,000 for ozone monitoring.

A few of our other priorities fell below the cut-line: Antelope Island SP Visitors Center (\$15 m.), Utah Lake Improvements (\$10 m.), Water Rights Measurement and Data Enhancements (\$5 m.), Drinking Water Emergency Grants (\$750,000), Air and Water Innovation Grants (\$10 m.), Mobile Air Quality Observation System (\$1.5 m.), GSL Dust Monitoring (\$72,000).
