The Legislative Update is made possible by the Utah Audubon Council and contributing organizations. Each Update provides bill and budget item descriptions and status updates throughout the Session, as well as important Session dates and key committees. The Legislative Update focuses on legislative information pertaining to wildlife, sensitive and invasive species, public lands, state parks, SITLA land management, energy development, renewable energy and conservation, and water issues. The Update will be distributed after each Friday of the Session. We may also send out additional Action Alerts during the Session as issues arise that need quick action. We hope each Update

issue will prepare you to contact your legislators with your opinions and concerns!

#### **ACTION ALERT!**

HB 476 Local Agricultural Amendments would prohibit local governments from deciding whether they want to have Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations in their communities. This is part of a big play to proliferate these big agribusiness CAFOs in rural counties that could endanger health, water, groundwater and quality of life. Tell legislators to support small farmers and ranchers, not giant ag conglomerates. HB 476 is in House NRAE committee Monday morning.

HB 443 - Utah Inland Port Authority Amendments is also up for a Senate hearing Monday morning. Let legislators know that we oppose this anti-democratic encroachment on local government powers and representation.

Support HJR 16 to swap out state lands in-holdings in Bears Ears NM for more developable federal lands.

## News of Week Six (Week # 6)

Utah Lake Authority (HB 232) that we oppose, passed the House and is now on the Senate calendar. So is HB 240, which we support. This issue will be around for a long while. In other "Authority" news, HB 443, SB 160 and SB 232 (MIDA) advanced the concentration of power in fewer unaccountable hands. HB 405 would require clean freight switcher engines in the Inland port. SB 136 was watered down but will study port air quality impacts if passed.

Fare Free UTA (HB 164) was heard and held, and the EV charging bill (HB 189) also went down to a narrow defeat in the House. Jordan River improvement bills (HB 173 and 319) moved toward enactment.

## **Budget News**

The "Additional Proposed Funding Items" were adopted by EAC Friday. While there may be some changes made, the budget bills must be passed by Wednesday. So there is still time to pressure legislative leaders to add or reduce funding.

It looks like a big year for investing in Utah's water future: \$30 m. for Utah Lake projects, \$50 m. for ag optimization; \$40 m. for Great Salt Lake; \$200 m. for secondary water metering; \$5 m. for HB 429; \$875,000 for waterbird studies; \$5 m. for turf removal (HB 121); \$2 m. for education about GSL; and funding to enforce laws against driving on GSL

lakebed. Lastly, in a gratifying win for Great Basin Water Network and allies, a \$5.2 m. request for the Cedar City Water Grab was not funded.

Mostly good news too for air quality and environment funds: \$3 m. was approved for EV infrastructure in rural Utah and \$8.6 m. in federal funds will go toward a major expansion of air quality monitoring.

## What's Ahead

Standing Committees will meet Monday and Tuesday for the last time from 8-10 and 4-6 and both chambers will be on the floor 10-12 and 2-4. The House will "wipe the boards" at the end of each day starting Tuesday night, and the Rules Committees control what gets prioritized. It will be floor time all the time Wednesday to sine die Friday midnight. Here are the calendars for (the last) Week 7:
