ACTION ALERT!

No Action Alert this week. No bills are recommended for a veto by the Governor.

News of Week Seven (Week # 7)

Some of the better news from the last week was what didn't pass. We worried all Session that there would be an effort to end-run Salt Lake County's opposition to the Grandeur Peak/Parley's Canyon gravel pit, but that never happened. A maneuver to sneak objectionable language stripping power from local governments regulating animal "enterprises" from HB 476 into the broader HB 305 was roundly trounced due to fast action by a diverse coalition of lobby interests. The other CAFO bill (HB 258) also failed this year.

Two bills we supported failed in the final days – HB 298 (artemia) and HJR 16 (BENM).

The Utah Inland Port bill (HB 443) passed, as did both Utah Lake bills (HB 232, HB 240). HB 405 failed, but Union Pacific agreed to swap out 3 Tier 0 freight switcher engines for cleaner Tier 2 locomotives, and to work to bring Tier 4 to its fleet of 40 switchers.

Budget News

The main budget bills were passed on Wednesday, 3/2, with only minor adjustments. All the budget items mentioned in the previous Update remained intact. To reiterate: \$30 m. for Utah Lake projects, \$50 m. for ag optimization; \$40 m. for Great Salt Lake; \$200 m. for secondary water metering;

\$5 m. for HB 429; \$875,000 for waterbird studies; \$5 m. for turf removal (HB 121); \$2 m. for education about GSL; funding to enforce laws against driving on GSL lakebed; \$3 m. for EV infrastructure in rural Utah; and \$8.6 m. in federal funds for expansion of air quality monitoring.

The final budget action was passage of the "Bill of Bills" (HB 3), which passed late on the last night of the Session (Friday 3/4). One addition was intent language that \$12 m. of the \$15 m. appropriation for Recreation Infrastructure (HB 409) be used to build visitor center at Antelope Is. SP.

One Billion dollars in federal ARPA funds was parked in the Transportation Investment Fund, not to be spent until July 2023 so that plans and preparations for use of the funding can be done in the meantime.

What's Ahead

The Governor has until March 20 to sign or veto all bills that passed. The normal effective date for all bills is May 4, which is also the first day to open a bill file for the 2023 General Session. Interim study dates and topics will be decided later, but are usually held on the 3rd Wednesday of each month May through November.
