GSLA Fall Grant Applications

The Great Salt Lake Audubon Grant Committee is pleased to announce that they are accepting applications for grants of up to \$2,000! The grant applications are due September 1, with the awards announcement to be made on October 15.

Qualifying applicants will be a non-profit organization with 501 (c)(3) status or a governmental/non-profit educational institution (i.e., university, school district, elementary school, etc).

Successful applicants should demonstrate that their request aligns with the *GSLA mission*, and projects should focus on areas such as conservation, education or academic research. While we will consider all applications, our preference is to fund hard costs such as equipment or supplies. In general, we will not fund salaries for existing organization staff except for rare circumstances.

An applicant organization may apply only once per year and grants will have an upper limit of \$2,000.

After years of service, Heather Dove will step down as President by year's end. Fortunately, Heather will continue to serve as the Conservation Chair. Heather has been extremely dedicated to GSLA and has contributed much of her time to our cause. She has made GSLA one of the top voices in Utah on environmental issues and the importance of protecting avian habitat.

Also by the end of the year, Ray Smith will step down as Vice President, and Jeanne Le Ber, Newsletter and Events Chair, will be reducing her duties and stepping away from the Board. Jeanne and Ray have been GSLA volunteers for many years.

These changes give us an opportunity to welcome new faces and new ideas to the organization. Please consider volunteering for GSLA. For the most part, birds have stopped hitting the windows, and the staff at the EWEC are extremely appreciative. The plan is to install tape on the remaining buildings.

May marked the last Birds 'n Bites until September. We ended on a high note with *Secrets of Raven Conversations: Language & Meaning from the World's Largest Songbird* with George Bumann. This was a fun and informative presentation! We plan on linking all the previous Birds 'n Bites presentations on our website, so stay tuned for that.

Education Update

The Great Salt Lake Bird Festival—Family Day

Family Day at the GSL Bird Festival (Saturday, May 18) was a huge success! I, Jeanne Le Ber, Ray Smith, and Tena Rohr spoke with 230 folks. Children who visited our table built 40 brine shrimp, 20 American Avocet and 25 Eared Grebe puppets. We provided prizes to families that completed Nature Bingo, Sagebrush Adventure Comics and Dark Sky Passport.

Last Fall, GSLA funded a grant to [Bridgerland Audubon](#) to partner with local artists to develop puppets as a way to educate local elementary students about the importance of the GSL watershed and its significance to maintaining a healthy ecosystem for birds and people. Using the designs of Therese Berry, Nan Seymour and Sarah May ([Making Waves for Great Salt Lake Artist Collaborative](#)) four Lake Puppets were created: the Brine Shrimp, American Avocet, Eared Grebe and Brine Fly. Red On Black

Walking along Loyds Lake in Monticello, Utah, I saw a black bird in the distance. While ravens commonly patrol the sky, this one looked different with a distinct red dot in front. As the bird approached, it became obvious that this red spot was not a body part but an object the bird had picked up.

The pieces of plastic we humans scatter around attract many foraging animals. Ingestion of plastic trash is common and at times deadly. A study of ravens showed that nearly 10% of the birds had some non-food trash items in their stomach.

Looking at the treasure this bird picked up, we may actually see an example of a

different, non-foraging behavior. Common Ravens pick up showy objects to impress their mates. They may even use their beak to point at a specific object they want the other bird to see, a form of communication that has otherwise only been observed in humans and great apes.

2024 Bluebird Box Spring Use Report

Twelve volunteers gathered in Strawberry Valley on Saturday, June 1 to assess the use of the one hundred nesting boxes placed by Great Salt Lake Audubon along the Per Fluge Langeland Bluebird Box Trail. The goal is to record data about the birds using the boxes.

Volunteers were divided into five teams with 2-3 people per team. Each team was assigned a set of 20 boxes and given a data sheet to record how the boxes were being used. A big thank you to participants: Becky Burrage, Julia and Nick D'Alesandro, Joy Emory, Cat Heinz, John Hill, Melanie Jones, Jeanne Le Ber, Nancy Lombardo, John Middleton, Ray Smith, and Patrick Watson.

The following chart details the species and numbers related to box use.

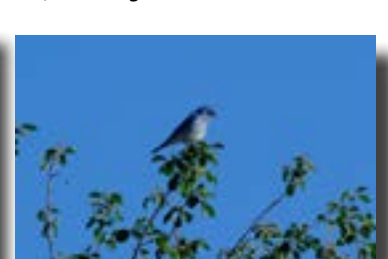
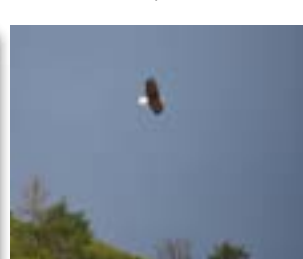
Occupying 35 boxes, the Tree Swallow is the major user of the artificial nest cavities. The Mountain Bluebird has built about half that number of nests at 17 but has laid more eggs than the Tree Swallow. The busy House Wren fills the box with twigs making it difficult to count the eggs but easy to identify the nest user.

Thirty-five boxes were empty. In the fall, we will determine if any birds used the empty boxes after June 1. Five of our boxes, with their attachment poles, were missing and will be replaced during the fall cleanup.

We invite you to join us in September for the box cleanup event. The date will be published in the next *Pelican* or you can view the field trip calendar under the *Events* tab from the GSLA home page.

B&R co-coordinators Jeanne Le Ber and Nancy Lombardo extend a big thank you to all the participants, field instructors and presenter. We couldn't have done it without you. We look forward to seeing you again next year at another location.

SLV ALAN Monitoring Underway

The Salt Lake Valley ALAN (artificial light at night) Monitoring Program (SLVAMP) is officially underway.

What started as a localized effort to monitor light pollution within the Gillmor Sanctuary has officially expanded into a valley-wide community science program made up of volunteers and students from Great Salt Lake Audubon, Audubon Rockies, Utah Valley University, and DarkSky Utah.

On Wednesday, June 5, at 11:00 PM, eleven volunteers ventured across the valley to collect our first set of night sky data at over twenty different pre-designated sampling sites. This initiative is ground breaking because not many other people are consistently monitoring light pollution at an urban level.

Most often this data is gathered at parks or small population centers that desire to obtain dark sky certification. We are on a mission to understand long-term trends of night sky brightness in our own backyards and to use this information to help inform planning, policy, and Lights Out initiatives.
